LiFePATH is committed to supporting Māori health and research capability. LiFePATH aims to fulfil the responsibilities and obligations under Te Tiriti o Waitangi, to reduce inequalities in Māori health outcomes, and increase and improve Māori participation and experience of research.

The LiFePATH Leaders prioritised our specific objective "to ensure all staff and students are trained to understand Māori cultural barriers to participation in research". To facilitate this, we have prepared information from current University resources for staff and students, especially people new to Liggins, so that "All staff and students have knowledge of resources to undertake a Māori cultural training programme".
